Sadly we said goodbye to Rita Turner in December 2017 when she passed away very suddenly and unexpectedly. Rita is missed, not only for her long standing commitment to her role as a Town Councillor but also for her good humour and sense of fun.

From 3rd May 2018, Royston Town Council is split into four wards; Royston Meridian (5 Councillors), Royston Palace (5 Councillors), Royston Town West (3 Councillors) and Royston Town South (2 Councillors).

The Full Council meeting and principal committee meetings are open to all members of the public and press. At the beginning of each meeting time is set aside to allow members of the public to make representation to the various committees about items on the agenda. Copies of the agendas are posted on the Town Hall notice-board and web-site. A calendar detailing the meetings for the coming year is also available on the web site.

The Town Council's Planning Committee makes recommendations on all of the planning applications for Royston. The Committee commented on over 100 applications throughout the year. Final decisions on all applications are made by North Herts District Council (NHDC).

School Visits

Royston Town Council organised another successful round of visits to local schools during the spring term 2018. Town, District and County Councillors visited a total of six schools to talk about their various roles in local government and to get the children's views on the town they live in. Of all the children asked, 99% liked living in Royston which is a very encouraging statistic!

Naturally Royston Working Party



Members of the Naturally Royston Working Party have again been very busy this year. They arranged the environmental section at the May Fayre which included a live hive of bees, birds of prey and an upcycled crafts stall.

Other projects undertaken:

Children's Photographic Competition – the winning entries in the competition were used to produce a calendar of images of Royston. The winners all received free copies of the calendar and the money raised from its sale, which was over £500, was donated to the Mayor's Community Trust Fund.

Royston Front Garden Competition – the Naturally Royston team travelled around Royston nominating residents' front gardens for entry into the new Competition. Judging took place in July 2017 and the top 3 winners received £100, £50 and £25 respectively, plus an award certificate.

Free transport was also provided for those that needed it with the generous help of Royston Community Transport.

Green Street Allotments

The allotment site in Royston is owned and managed by the Town Council. You must be a Royston resident to rent an allotment.

Royston War Memorial

Royston War Memorial in Melbourn Street was erected in 1922 in memory of the Servicemen of the town killed in the First World War. Later it was extended to include those who were killed during the Second World War. It is now a listed monument and becomes the centre of attention each year for the annual Remembrance Day Parade.

Royston Town Council have recently received Listed Building Consent to carry out reparation and renovation to the War Memorial. The works also include the installation of two ramps at

the Memorial which will ensure that access is improved for all. It is hoped that the work will be finished in time for the Remembrance Day parade in November 2018.

ROYSTON & DISTRICT MUSEUM & ART GALLERY enriching the community



Royston is proud to have its own Museum and Art Gallery which is a vital cultural and tourist attraction. It sits at the heart of the Royston community and celebrates the wonderful stories of the town and its people.

The museum is open every Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday throughout the year. Regular events at the Museum include Knit and Natter, printing workshops using the original 1855 Crow printing press, reminiscence groups, toddler dance workshops, adult movement classes and many schools and community groups have private visits to the Museum.

In 2017, the Museum achieved full accreditation renewal from the Arts Council and also a forward planning consultation was undertaken from which a forward plan was produced with the main aim being to be the centre of the community in Royston.

Royston Annual May Fayre

One of the Town Council's annual events is the May Fayre. In partnership with other organisations and volunteers, the Town Council continues to run this yearly event in the Priory Memorial Gardens taking place on the first Bank Holiday in May. It gives local charities and voluntary organisations a chance to fund raise for themselves. Admission to the event is free.

This year was the busiest yet with hundreds of people enjoying the day. There was fun for all the family with the Town Band keeping the crowds entertained with their music and regulars such as the miniature railway, the Punch and Judy show and the Novelty Dog Show which had a record number of entries. Free bungee trampolines were provided thanks to a grant from the Town Council. New attractions this year included Professor Crump (see picture below) and a hive of live bees and birds of prey in the eco-corner.



Running alongside the May Fayre was the Historical Car Show which was organised by the Rotary Club.

Community Halls & Royston Picture Palace

Other services the Town Council provides include the provision of public halls, namely the Town Hall and Market Hill Rooms. Our two community halls are hired out to various local organisations, community groups and privately to members of the public for children's parties, fitness classes and social events such as guizzes.

The Town Hall is used as a state of the art, digital cinema every Friday and Saturday evening throughout the year. A children's matinee is held on the first Saturday of every month. Our thanks go to the many volunteers who give up their time to help put on the performances; without them the show could not go on.

The Leete Charity Trust

The Town Council is the sole Trustee of this charity. The charity provides grants towards further education for students who live, or attend a school, in Royston. The grants are made from the interest earned on the Trust's investments. During the last year, a total of £1,500 was awarded to 9 young people going on to further education.

Green Walk Plantation & Stile Plantation

Two small plantations link the town centre to open countryside and footpaths. These plantations are a hidden secret of the town and are used for walking and wildlife spotting. The Town Council have added information boards and benches to sites and undertake additional tree planting when required to compensate for the natural loss of some of the woodland.

Royston Cave

A heritage site, owned by the Town Council. The Cave has been centre stage on a few occasions this year, and has been frequented by visitors and celebrities and their production companies from all around the world.

The Royston and District local History Society manage the opening of the Cave to visitors on the afternoons of Saturdays and Sundays and Bank Holidays, from Easter Sunday to the end of September, and Wednesday afternoons during August, from 2.30pm to 4.30pm. Private visits are available at other times by arrangement with the cave manager.

Entry price for 2017 was £5 for adults, £4 for seniors and £1 for children over the age of 5. Babes in arms were free. Special openings for groups were charged at £80 per session.

During 2017, 2,461 adults and 614 children visited the Cave on normal openings, a further 1021 visited as part of a special opening.


