Royston Town Council

All Town Councillors serve in a voluntary capacity and are elected for a four year term of office. Councillors are not paid and do not receive any allowances for attending meetings. Full Council meetings and principal committee meetings are open to all members of the public and the press. At the beginning of each meeting time is set aside to allow members of the public to make representation to the various committees about items on the agenda. Copies of the agendas are posted on the Town Hall notice-board and Council web-site. A calendar detailing the meetings for the coming year is also available on the web site. The Town Council's Planning Committee makes recommendations on all of the planning applications for Royston. The Committee commented on over 100 applications throughout the year. Final decisions on all applications are made by North Herts District Council (NHDC).

School Visits

Royston Town Council organised another successful round of visits to local schools during the spring term 2019. The schools visited this year were Icknield Walk First School, Roman Way First School, St Mary's Primary School and Studlands Rise First School. Town, District and County Councillors all took part and children were well engaged and put forward several ideas which have been taken on board.

Naturally Royston Working Party



This year the Naturally Royston Working Party mainly focussed on the natural environment and how to make our gardens a friendly habitat for pollinating insects. They hosted a very popular stand at the May Fayre and handed out seeds for nectar rich flowers and materials to make a bug hotel at home. The seeds were donated by John O'Conner Grounds Maintenance to honour their 50 year anniversary.

Naturally Royston is also currently arranging for the siting and unveiling of a commemorative plaque for the tree sculpture in Priory Gardens which is dedicated to the late Cllr Peter Burt who inspired the work.

Green Street Allotments

The allotment site in Royston is owned and managed by the Town Council. You must be a Royston resident to rent an allotment.

Royston War Memorial

Royston War Memorial in Melbourn Street was erected in 1922 in memory of the Servicemen of the town killed in the First World War. Later it was extended to include those who were killed during the Second World War. It is now a listed monument and becomes the centre of attention each year for the annual Remembrance Day Parade.

Royston Town Council have recently carried out reparation and renovation to the War Memorial. The works included the installation of two ramps at the Memorial to ensure improved access for all. The work was complete for the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War and huge

crowds attended the parade to mark this significant event. The Council gives thanks to the Brian Racher Trust, Johnson Matthey and NPK Holdings for their donations towards the cost of the works. The picture on the cover of this annual report shows the refurbished War Memorial.

ROYSTON & DISTRICT MUSEUM & ART GALLERY enriching the community



Royston is proud to have its own Museum and Art Gallery, which celebrates the wonderful stories of the District and its people. The Museum aims to be the centre of the community in Royston, and hosts regular events for a variety of interests. Activities cater to all ages, abilities, and access needs.

The museum is open every Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday throughout the year, with private bookings available all other days. Museum staff can also facilitate external events for community groups, including outreach and reminiscence sessions.

In 2017, the Museum achieved full accreditation renewal from the Arts Council. The Museum cares for the archive of the Royston Crow, an extensive collection of works by E.H. Whydale, and the renowned Royston Tapestry.

The Town Council's thanks go to the Friends of the Museum, the Royston & District Local History Society, and the Royston & District Local History Society Trustees of the Collection. Royston Annual May Fayre

One of the Town Council's annual events is the May Fayre. In partnership with other organisations and volunteers, the Town Council continues to run this yearly event in the Priory Memorial Gardens taking place on the first Bank Holiday in May. It gives local charities and voluntary organisations a chance to fund raise for themselves. Admission to the event is free.

Again the event was very busy, despite the chilly weather, with hundreds of people enjoying the day. There was fun for all the family with the Town Band keeping the crowds entertained with their music and regulars such as the miniature railway, the Punch and Judy show and the Novelty Dog Show. Free attractions, 'Circus Whiz' and 'Last Man Standing' were provided thanks to funding from Royston Town Council.



Running alongside the May Fayre was the Historical Car Show which was organised by the Rotary Club.

Community Halls & Royston Picture Palace

The Town Council provides public halls which can be hired, namely the Town Hall and Market Hill Rooms. Our two community halls are hired out to various local organisations, community groups and privately to members of the public for children's parties, fitness classes and social events such as quizzes.

The Town Hall is used as a state of the art, digital cinema every Friday and Saturday evening throughout the year. Our thanks go to the many volunteers who give up their time to help put on the performances; without them the show could not go on.

The Leete Charity Trust

The Town Council is the sole Trustee of this charity. The charity provides grants towards further education for students who live, or attend a school, in Royston. The grants are made from the interest earned on the Trust's investments. During the last year, a total of £1,450 was awarded to 8 young people going on to further education.

Green Walk Plantation & Stile Plantation

Two small plantations link the town centre to open countryside and footpaths. These plantations are a hidden secret of the town and are used for walking and wildlife spotting. The Town Council have added information boards and benches to the sites and have undertaken some additional tree planting this year, using hazel trees donated by a local resident, to compensate for the natural loss of some of the woodland.

Royston Cave

As a world famous, Grade I listed heritage site, the uniqueness and mystery of Royston Cave continues to attract visitors from across the globe. Open every Saturday, Sunday and Bank Holiday, from Easter weekend until the end of September, Royston Cave opened for general admission across 65 dates in 2018, with the addition of 25 private tours and the annual return of its successful Cave by Candlelight event, held in December. During 2018, Royston Cave welcomed a total of 3401 visitors, with general admission costing £5 for adults, £4 for seniors and £2 for children. Private tours were made by arrangement and charged at £80 per session.

In September, Nicky Paton was appointed as the new manager of Royston Cave and has since worked with the Cave Advisory sub-committee to introduce a host of new features and procedures. This includes the redesign of Royston Cave's visual identity, across digital and printed material, which aims to elevate the cave's physical and digital presence to a level befitting a renowned heritage attraction. From the revision of tourist leaflets, guide brochures and tickets, to the design of new visitor information signage, event posters and online content, Royston Cave is aiming to offer a more professional and pointed visitor experience.

Royston Cave is also working in close collaboration with Royston Museum to introduce new educational programmes, resources and events which will benefit the wider Royston community. This includes a three-dimensional, 360 degree, interactive virtual tour of Royston Cave, which is currently in the development stage but expected to be in use by the end of the year.

In November, due to ongoing issues with water ingress and deterioration, Royston Cave was added to Historic England's Heritage at Risk Register. The register highlights the most vulnerable historical sites in England. With help from specialists, conservation is ongoing, but the uniqueness

of Royston Cave means progress is slow. A report is currently being compiled which will outline the most effective strategies to conserve the cave moving forward.

The new 2019 season has now officially started and the efforts of the new management team are already being realised, with visitor footfall forecasted to increase from 2018. Prices and opening times have remained the same with the addition of a new student ticket option which has proved popular.





Budgeting for 2019-2020 has included increased maintenance at the Plantations due to the ageing trees, funding for a legacy project to introduce new facilities, on which the residents of Royston will be consulted, and removal of zero hours contracts for staff.
